The main activity in English & Computing will be to write the book 'Oliver Twist' blurb. If you forgot the story please look at the previous Home Learning reading sections.


Let's focus now how to write a Book blurb


Why would we write a book blurb?

A blurb is the text on back cover of a book. It is a summary of the story. It aims to get the reader interested in buying or reading the book.

Look at some book blurbs on the following pages. (Think about: What have I noticed?)





What Makes a Good Blurb?

- They are short in length
- They use attention-grabbing words and phrases
- They often use question and exclamation marks
- They often use an ellipsis (...)at the end to leave the reader asking questions

Short in length

- Keep it short. Book blurbs are generally not more than 6 or 7 sentences.
- Hook your reader with your first sentence. Use expressive words, an intriguing setting or simply place your reader in the middle of the action!

Attention-grabbing words and phrases

Use extreme action verbs. Use adjectives like "sizzling", "crackling" or "shattering." Then there's the ever popular "spine-tingling" used for thrillers and supernatural fiction.

Use question and exclamation marks

- Tease your reader by finishing with an unanswered question, a problem or mystery.
- Give a hint of how the character fits into the central theme.
- The blurb sets the atmosphere of the book. It must to match reader's expectations and age.

Describe the journey

"The author takes us through..." or "(Author) introduces the reader to..." similar phrases are often used to set the stage, giving the reader a preview of the setting or plot.

End with a bang!

Main Activity

Write the book blurb for 'Oliver Twist' by Charles Dickens.
