Time to learn about words in context



What does 'words in context' mean?

Many times we run into new words for the first time. Using the words near to the new unknown word, we can often find out the meaning of that word. This is called using the word in context. Authors often will write sentences with this in mind for the reader. Let us look at an example!

Do you know what "harkarl" is?

What if it was used in this sentence:

Mr. Bjorn prepared his favourite family dish of harkarl for us last night.

By the words of the sentence we can tell that this "harkarl" is a type of traditional cultural food. Harkarl is a traditional dish in Iceland. It's actually aged or some consider it rotten, shark.



If you chose unwilling....
